NATURE NOTES by Peter Marren

After one of the best seasons for mushrooms and toadstools in years, fungi were fruiting on mild days almost into December. Woodchip mulch is widely used on flowerbeds, especially in public places, to suppress weeds and maintain relatively warm, moist soil underneath. The chips break down slowly with the help of fungi, and over the years a specialised fungus flora has developed there, that is rich in non-native species from as far away as Australia. One of these was brightening the borders and beds at Littlecote, bright orange-red in colour with a roundish cap and dark spores. It has been named the redlead roundhead, as its colour is the same as redlead or minium, formerly used in pottery and in anti-corrosive paints. It was accompanied by other fungi feasting on the chips, including a cup fungus, a dome-cap and a cavalier (don't ask me why a mushroom should be named a cavalier, even though it did grow among roundheads! Civil war among the fungi?). Not far away there were a few late field blewits, one of the best edible wild mushrooms and delicious with a bit of bacon.

There have been reports of the lovely hummingbird hawkmoth flying in November and even December. This day-flying moth, which behaves much like a hummingbird, hovering at its favourite flowers, is a migrant from southern Europe. By rights, they should all have gone south by now, but presumably there are enough late-flowering garden flowers to maintain them (hovering is thirsty work). It seems that one or two even managed to survive the winter last year, though this is not normally a hibernating species. The same is true of the red admiral which is now often the earliest butterfly of the year. It doesn't hibernate fully, unlike its relatives the peacock and the comma, and so will fly in mild winter weather, presumably fuelled by fats imbibed from rotting fruit the previous autumn. All these things are new. Winter is no longer the dead time of year. The climate is changing and life changes with it, for better or worse.

BIRD NOTES by Paul Swan

Looking down from Spring Hill we watched a heron chasing a great white egret along the valley until they landed on different sides of the Manor Lake. These are two of our largest birds, one very common indeed and the other a relative rarity. The egret was probably Edgar, our regular winter visitor that terrorized our village ponds a couple of years ago. The egret has a wingspan of 1.5 metres, while the heron can be up to nearly 2 metres. Clearly the heron was the aggressor in this contest over fishing rights.

At the Triangle we saw a water rail flying across the river. These are extremely secretive birds that spend most of their time hidden in the rushes. Their call is unmistakable as it sounds like a piglet squealing! We

have also seen them this year at Seven Bridges, so we probably have a couple spending the winter with us. On a recent sunny day, we watched a group of seven red kites flying to and from a single tree near the Priory. They seemed to be taking it in turns to do a couple of circuits before returning to base. In the bright sunshine their plumage was stunning. One absentee from our winter visitors seems to be the large flock of golden plover. Fingers crossed that they will turn up in the new year. In the garden we had the pleasure of watching a thrush taking a bath in our small pond. There was a lot of splashing and then a very careful preening of every single wing feather. The blackbirds are busy flicking over the fallen leaves in search of a morsel or two, while the sparrows are still hurtling about. Although getting mature now, they always seem like an excited group of teenagers! The robin, with its relatively large eyes, feeds earlier and later than most other birds, and our local bird looks particularly fit and in fine fettle. Let's hope that our relatively mild weather continues into the New Year.

RAINFALL by Robert Osmond

November with 153mm of rain was the wettest month since Sept. 2024. We had measurable rain on 22 days and 50% above the monthly average of 101mm. With the continuation of the wet spell into December we may well be near the average for the year in spite of the exceptionally dry Summer.

When it wasn't raining we had some frosts in November which brings to mind the old saying "Ice in November to hold up a duck, the rest of the Winter will be as wet as muck !" We'll soon find out !

Also with the shortest day coming soon - "As the days grow longer the cold grows stronger".
